Billy Bishop Toronto City Airport

Movement of People and Goods

PortsToronto: 2022

 PortsToronto recorded strong financial results in 2022, while staying true to our commitment of sustainable operations, engaging with our community, and investing in city-building initiatives.



PortsToronto: 2022 Results

- PortsToronto reported operating revenue of \$65.4 million in 2022, an increase of \$25.7 million over 2021 revenue of \$39.7 million.
- PortsToronto had a net income from operations in 2022 of \$30.4 million, versus \$10.0 million in 2021, an improvement of \$20.4 million year-over-year.



Financial Performance

- Strong financial performance is important to any organization and is one of the key measures of its success.
- PortsToronto is mandated to be financially self-sufficient and self-sustaining.
- PortsToronto's profitability enables reinvestment back into infrastructure and the community.
- Operational activities, infrastructure development projects, environmental initiatives and community investment programs are all entirely dependent on our ability to maintain profitability.
- Profitability is not only a measure of our performance, but also a measure of the degree to which we can reinvest to the benefit of the city of Toronto.








Billy Bishop Airport

- Billy Bishop Airport has traditionally been the largest business unit, contributing approximately 70 per cent of revenues to the organization.
- COVID-19 pandemic impacted travel in first part of the year. In early summer travel restrictions were removed and travel demand came roaring back.
- Billy Bishop Airport was largely spared from much of the air travel challenges faced by other airports as a result of this surging demand.
- Passenger numbers climbed to 1.7 million by the end of 2022.
- For the first five months of 2023, Billy Bishop Airport is tracking at approximately 75% relative to the same time in 2019.



Port of Toronto: Commercial Shipping

- The Port of Toronto experienced another strong year in 2022.
- For the sixth consecutive year, port moved more than 2 million metric tonnes of bulk and general cargo.
- Welcomed 191 cargo ships bringing sugar, salt, cement, aggregate and steel directly to the heart of the city, reinforcing the Port of Toronto's important role in the national supply chain.
- Arrival of another bridge span from Nova Scotia via tug-and-barge for Waterfront Toronto's Port Lands Flood Protection project and provided berthing for a marine vessel delivering three high-value transformers to the City of Toronto.



Port of Toronto: Passenger Cruise Ships

 Welcomed 41 cruise ships to Toronto in 2022, bringing approximately 13,000 passengers to the city to enjoy its attractions, theatre, shopping and restaurants, and contributing to the City's economic recovery.



Port Of Toronto: Role

- Port of Toronto plays an important role in the national transportation chain and in supporting the largest economy in Canada.
- As the pandemic affected supply chains and distribution around the world, the port served as a regular and reliable gateway to receive the materials that Toronto and region required to keep the local economy moving.
- Port has an important role to play in environmental sustainability – cargo delivered to the Port of Toronto last year took the equivalent of approximately 54,000, 40-tonne trucks off Toronto's roads and highways.
- Ship transport is significantly more fuel efficient than trucks, using one-eighth as much fuel to carry the same amount of cargo.



Outer Harbour Marina

- Demand for winter storage remained strong in the 2022-2023 winter season, and summer berthing renewals resulted in a 100 per cent occupancy level.
- Recreational boating continued to be a favoured activity in Toronto with many new boaters coming from neighbouring residential areas of the city.



Property and Other

- Fourth business unit, Property and Other, including investments, reported operating income of \$4.0 million in 2022, up from \$2.9 million the year prior.
- Property and Other includes the rental of various properties along the waterfront as well as investment income earned on PortsToronto's cash reserves.



Taxes & Investments

- Significant payments made to various levels of governments including Payments in Lieu of Taxes (PILTs) and property taxes to the City of Toronto; and the Gross Revenue Charge to the federal government.
- Revenues also enable PortsToronto to make meaningful investments in our sustainability plan that included environmental initiatives and community investments.



Sustainability: Marilyn Bell

- Marilyn Bell ferry converted to 100 per cent electric power in December 2021, and the full impact of its cleaner, greener and quieter operations came into effect in 2022.
- Powered entirely by electricity from clean wind and solar sources provided by Bullfrog Power, the retrofitted

 Marilyn Bell has eliminated greenhouse gas emissions from the ferry operation, reducing the airport's direct emissions by approximately 530 tonnes per year.
- Builds on the airport's Noise Management Program, and operates far more quietly, dramatically reducing related noise in the surrounding community.
- This is the first all-electric ferry in Canada setting the standard for the introduction of similar marine vehicles in the future.





Sustainability: Trash Trapping Program

- PortsToronto further expanded its successful Seabin Program and deployed a record 10 Seabins in 2022, including six new locations on the Toronto waterfront.
- Data collected through the program's research partnership with the University of Toronto Trash Team confirms that Seabins in the PortsToronto network removed more than 90,000 small pieces of plastic pollution from the Toronto Harbour in 2022.



Sustainability: Reporting


- The 2022 Billy Bishop Airport Sustainability Report was published on April 12; and the 2022 PortsToronto Sustainability Report was published on May 25.
- Each report provides an overview of our efforts and reports on areas such as Greenhouse-Gas Emissions, energy usage, and waste management.
- Purchase 100 per cent of our power needs from renewable sources such as wind and hydro through Bullfrog Power. PortsToronto is one of only a few organizations in Canada to use renewable energy for its entire operations, and the only airport and port authority in Canada to do so.

Since 2010, PortsToronto has powered all of its operations with 100 per cent green electricity through Bullfrog Power Canada. In 2022, PortsToronto renewed its agreement with Bullfrog Power until 2026



Audited Financial Statements

- PortsToronto's 2022 Audited Financial Statements and 2022 Management Discussion and Analysis (MD&A) were posted to the PortsToronto website on May 3, 2023.
- Auditor's Report can be found on pages 1 and 2. In this section, under the heading of "Opinion," the Auditor's Report from Deloitte is once again an unqualified or "clean" audit opinion.
- PortsToronto presents its financial statements pursuant to International Financial Reporting Standards or ("IFRS").
- 2022 MD&A Report should be read in conjunction with the Audited Financials.



Audited Financial Statements

- For 2022, PortsToronto reported operating revenue of \$65.4 million, an increase of \$25.7 million over 2021 revenue of \$39.7 million.
- PortsToronto had a net income from operations in 2022 of \$30.4 million, versus \$10.0 million in 2021, an improvement of \$20.4 million year-over-year.



Financial Performance: Billy Bishop Airport

- Billy Bishop Toronto City Airport's performance in 2022 had a material impact on the financial performance of the organization.
- With demand for air travel improving in the second half of the year, operating income for the airport was \$24.0 million in 2022, up from \$5.0 million in 2021 and higher than \$22.1 million recorded in 2019.
- Total passenger volume in 2022 was approximately 1.7 million versus approximately 2.8 million in 2019.



Financial Performance: Port of Toronto

- The marine Port of Toronto had a strong year.
- For the sixth consecutive year, moved more than
 2 million metric tonnes of bulk and general cargo.
- The combination of activities which included commercial shipping and passenger cruises resulted in operating income from all sources of \$6.2 million, up from \$5.5 million recorded in 2021.

Financial Performance: Outer Harbour Marina

• The Outer Harbour Marina benefitted from continued interest in personal watercraft ownership and reported operating income of \$2.8 million in 2022 on revenues of \$6.1 million.



The Outer Harbour Marina achieved the Green Anchors Diamond rating in the Clean Marine Eco-Rating Program in 2022. OHM previously held a Gold rating in the Clean Marine program for 11 consecutive years.



Financial Performance: Property & Other

- Property & Other, including investments, reported operating income of \$4.0 million in 2022, up from \$2.9 million the year prior.
- Property & Other includes the rental of various properties along the waterfront as well as investment income earned on PortsToronto's cash reserves, which increased in 2022 versus 2021, due to higher interest.



Payments and Taxes

- Strong revenues across all of our business units resulted in significant payments to various levels of governments including \$1.1 million in Payments in Lieu of Taxes (PILTs) to the City of Toronto, as well as \$2.3 million in property taxes.
- Amounts accrued and paid to the federal government and to the City of Toronto together totaled \$6.6 million for 2022, and \$6.4 million for 2021, representing 10.1% and 16.2% of PortsToronto's Operating Revenue in fiscal years 2022 and 2021, respectively.



Looking Forward

Optimistic that 2023 will continue along this upward trajectory as we continue to see:

- Recoveries in the aviation sector;
- Increased demand for travel in the air and on water, with cruise ship visits expected to set another record; and,
- The optimization of myriad assets that PortsToronto has within its business portfolio.
